YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH COURT WORKER PROGRAM

An Accredited Children's Mental Health Centre

YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH COURT WORKER

The Youth Mental Health Court Worker provides support to youth involved in the Youth Justice System (age 12 to 17 years at the time of charge) who struggle with their mental health. The worker will provide the youth with support during the court process and will assist the youth in connecting to local services that may be helpful to them.

If the charge before the court is for a lesser offence, the youth will be assisted in applying to the Crown Attorney's Office to be diverted away from the court process. A diversion plan will be created and if the youth complies with the plan, the charge may be withdrawn.

If the youth does not apply to be diverted or the diversion application is denied, the court worker will continue to provide support to the youth during the court involvement, helping to connect them to appropriate programs and support.

Is there a cost to this program?

There is no cost for this program. The program is funded by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services-Youth Justice Services and offered through Children's Mental Health Services, Hasting and Prince Edward Counties.

What is the Service Area?

Youth Courts in Belleville, Bancroft and Picton are supported by this program.

GOALS OF THE PROGRAM

- To identify the mental health needs of the youth involved in the Criminal Justice System.
- To support the diversion of youth away from the Criminal Justice System to community based mental health resources and services.
- To facilitate referrals and improve access to community based mental health resources, to minimize involvement in the Criminal Justice System.
- To provide information and support to family members and care givers of youth with mental health issues.
- To provide consultation to the Youth Justice Court, Crown Attorney, Defense/ Duty Counsel and community agencies.

REFERRAL SOURCES

Referrals can be made at any stage of the court process by a youth, family member, care giver, Youth Justice Court, Crown Attorney, Defense/ Duty Counsel, or community agency.

FACTS ABOUT YOUTH AND JUSTICE

- It is estimated that one in five youth has a diagnosable mental illness.
- Females are more likely than males to have an anxiety and mood disorder.
- Youth in the justice system experience substantially higher rates of mental illness than youth in the general population.
- Anxiety and mood disorders often cooccur with disruptive behaviour disorders and substance use disorders.
- Youth and the justice system often present with other risk factors including trauma, abuse, teen pregnancy, precocious exit from home and early school leaving.
